

17-Yr-Old Tech Prodigy Explains What Every Christian Needs to Know About AI w/Nathan@Natasha_Crain

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FRANK:

Ladies and gentlemen, what should Christians think about AI, artificial intelligence? Should we use it? If we do use it, what do we have to be aware of? What are the worldview assumptions behind it? Will AI ever lie to you? We're actually going to find out today. You know, many years ago. Jack Welch, he was the CEO of General Electric, and he had a 19-year-old mentor.

A 19-year-old mentor? An old man having a 19-year-old mentor? Why? Because the 19-year-old knew computers and digital stuff that Jack didn't know. So today we're actually going to have a 17-year-old mentor with us. His name is Nathan Crain. Here he is, ladies and gentlemen. And he's with his mom, the great Natasha Crain, and we also have the great Phoenix Hayes with us here. We are at the Cross Examined Instructor Academy in Charlotte, North Carolina, and Nathan is about to give a presentation on the worldview assumptions of AI.

So Nathan, I got to start here. Well, first of all, before I get to you, did you know that this young son of yours would be a child prodigy from what? Third grade, second grade, first grade. When--

NATASHA:

Well, he's always had a really strong interest in technology. So it started in like third grade, where he discovered something called Scratch. I mean, he can describe what Scratch is more, but it's just like a really basic kind of coding program that kids learn to code on.

And then he just took it from there and forevermore, he was really just intensely interested in computers and programming and taught himself how to do all kinds of things that he can explain, but yeah, he's been interested in this for a very long time.

FRANK:

All right, so Nathan, you started in third grade doing what?

NATHAN:

Doing, as she said, Scratch. It's basically super simple coding. I got this book for Christmas; it was like coding games in Scratch.



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I'm like, I want to make games. That sounds awesome. So that kind of got me into computer science in general. What it means to use computers. Like when I think of computers, I get so excited because it's basically you have the power to do so many things. Using just the power of doing calculations really fast, and the more creatively you can use that, it just gets so exciting.

So, anyways, the first time I really ever got into this, like I said, with Scratch, that's the block coding. So, if you think of the term lines of code, that's you type out all this code that goes into a program. Scratch was just you drag and drop blocks onto each other. You keep going down. It's like one command after the other. If you press the right key, then your player moves to the right. That was fun and interesting.

FRANK:

What was the first thing you built doing that?

NATHAN:

I made so many crappy games.

[PHOENIX]:

Is this a Christian network? We have to bleep the word crap.

FRANK:

No, no, no. We're all right. We're all right.

NATHAN:

No, that's the thing. That's kind of the joke with game developers. You just have to make really horrible games, but a lot of them.

FRANK:

But you have progressed and earlier this year, or was it last year you did release a pretty radically intense game that is very well done. What's it called?

NATHAN:

Nitro Turtles.

FRANK:

Nitro Turtles. That's never been said, those two words have never been said together on the American Family Radio Network. What is Nitro Turtles? Or Nitro Turtles, I should say.

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NATHAN:

So it's a PC game. You can check it out on Steam, if you're interested. But basically imagine Mario Kart, but there's no Mario and there's definitely no karts at all. But you have really fast turtles, and this is this is like so fun to make. I really love turtles. Turtles are my favorite animals, and I just wanted something cool to make. This was after I got into more of the advanced side of programming, moving from Scratch to years later, learning about how to type out lines of code. I spent so much time on that project, just thinking about how the code should work.

How do I make this happen? How do I do the art? I love the art. Like I consider myself a digital artist who likes to create these fun courses, like these amazing worlds. Like there's this one level I made that I'm really proud of called the Turtle Tar Pits, and basically, it's kind of like the La Brea Tar Pits in LA where there's just big fossilized turtles and you have to race around the mud and it's like I love that creative side of technology, stuff like that. That's what Nitro Turtles is.

FRANK:

Okay, so people can find that going to Steam, which is an app. What is Steam?

NATHAN:

Oh, Steam is like the biggest—

FRANK:

For us boomers, what's what is Steam?

NATASHA:

Explain to Frank. What is Steam?

NATHAN:

Imagine like the App Store, but just for PC games. It's like the biggest PC games distribution platform.

FRANK:

Okay, so you built that, and then you got into AI. How did you get into AI?

NATHAN:

I heard a bunch of people talking about this. They're like, "This is revolutionizing the way we do work. This is revolutionizing how people think about things. What, how we act in reference to humanity. It's causing a lot of interesting questions." And just as someone who's interested in

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technology, I'm like, I want to adopt that. I want to get really good at that and be ahead of it so that I'm not falling behind when it comes to how society is adapting this. So earlier this year, I just signed up for my first Claude subscription.

FRANK: Okay, what is Claude for people that don't know?

NATHAN:

Yeah, so Claude is, it's an AI platform basically. If you use ChatGPT, they both have similar functionality, but Claude at the time was more focused on being able to have AI that can perform tasks like coding, or sending emails, or managing spreadsheets, or stuff like that, than ChatGPT, the competitor basically.

So, I just got into that and I was like, how can I, how can I use this to change how I work and think about things? And quickly, I realized that there's a lot of moral and worldview considerations to how you actually use AI. There's a lot of really interesting issues that we have to face as humans when we consider how we actually use this.

So then the question was not only how can I use this to work super efficiently or do things faster and have more time to do other things that I love, but the question was also on top of that. What are the moral considerations here? What are the worldview assumptions behind the technology itself? And how should we as Christians respond to that?

FRANK:

So there is no such thing as a neutral platform when it comes to AI. Because why? Why can't it be worldview neutral or morally neutral?

NATHAN:

Well, when we think about a human, can a human be worldview neutral or morally neutral? Definitely not. We know as Christians, everyone has a worldview, and it's kind of the same with AI, but for a slightly different reason.

So, AI, and when I say AI here, I'm mostly referring to LLM, large language model technology, which means the type of AI that's making text, the type of AI like ChatGPT, or Claude, or Gemini.

FRANK:

Or Perplexity.

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NATHAN:

Or, yeah Perplexity or Grok, there's a ton —

FRANK:

So, you go to one of these websites or apps and you type in tell me all the verses in the Bible that say x and it'll pop it out for you.

NATHAN:

Yeah. In fact, I would think that's a great use of AI.

FRANK:

Okay, but how does it then get into moral questions? What kind of moral assumptions are built into the code, if you will?

NATHAN:

Built into the foundation of the AI itself, what are the moral assumptions? Well, it turns out to even have the ability to generate text in the first place, it has to be trained on human text.

And this is just broadly speaking for all types of AI. This, this would not even just be generating text. AI just means you're training a computer to do something, and to train a computer to do something, you need to give it tons of examples. So AI is trained on hundreds of thousands of pieces of text that go into it. This could be internet text. This could be books.

This could be articles and magazines. And this text is not worldview-neutral. It's going to be affected by sin. It's going to represent to some degree the fall, human fallen nature. And because of that. AI is able to produce moral language. It's able, for better or worse, it's able to produce language that could be good and morally uplifting.

It's also able to produce bad moral language or make really immoral assertions as a result of that.

FRANK:

And that needs to be input on the front end. Which way is the AI going to go on a moral question. I know we're coming up to a break here, but I know Phoenix, in developing a presentation we were doing for our book, *The War on Reality*, you would type in a prompt into AI to give us an image that we wanted to present, and it would say, "Sorry, I can't do that" because of some sort of moral consideration.

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And we'll cover that when we come back. We're coming up to a break right now. You're listening to I Don't Have Enough Faith to Be an Atheist. We're talking about AI. What should Christians know about it? Can we use it? Can we use it rightly? What are illicit uses of it? And what about the worldview considerations, particularly the moral ones? We'll talk more with Nathan Crain, Natasha Crain, and Phoenix Hayes. Don't go anywhere.

Welcome back to I Don't Have Enough Faith to Be an Atheist with me, Frank Turek, on the American Family Radio Network and other stations around the country. Today we're talking about AI. It is everywhere. How should Christians use it, if at all? And if we do use it, what do we have to be aware of? And just before the break, Phoenix, we were talking about we both had this experience trying to create images for PowerPoint presentations. We put into one of these AI sites, "Hey, I'd like an image of X," and it will argue with you or say, "I can't do that." Can you give an example of that?

PHOENIX:

Yeah. So as we were preparing for our presentation on Marxism and the ideas coming through. I mean, this is one thing that I love about AI is it can create your analogies and concepts in your head and often turn them into a visual piece to help aid as you're speaking and presenting on things.

Well, we had to address the topic of identity, so I wanted an image of something so contradictory that an audience could immediately recognize it. So the prompt was, "I need an image of a white female protester wearing a T-shirt that says, 'I identify as a six-foot Chinese man,'" okay.

And AI kicked back, "I can't create politically charged images for you." And I just wrote back and said, "Oh, don't worry, AI. This isn't political. This is just about identity." And it didn't seem to mind my response, and then it produced the image. Whereas there are other times where I'll say, "No, this isn't about politics. This is just a satire or this is anything," and it will just completely refuse. So I can't negotiate with it sometimes and sometimes I can't.

FRANK:

So there is a worldview assumption or at least some moral parameters inserted into that system, to say I can't do it if it's political, but I can do it if you're just trying to show identity.

PHOENIX:

Yes, but I wouldn't do it even if I explained this is satire. Like this is to explain an extreme situation, to then highlight—

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FRANK:

Because that might be transphobic if you did that, or that's been programmed in? How does this work, Nathan? How does, how do these AI, are they AI companies? I know there's ChatGPT, right? There's Grok, who's part of X/Twitter. There's Perplexity. There's Dominion, which is apparently a Christian one. You might know something about. There's also Anthropic, that's behind Claude. Am I right here?

NATHAN:

Yeah.

FRANK:

Man, I'm a boomer and I'm, check this out. Okay, okay, so how does, how does, who puts the morality into these systems is my question.

NATHAN:

Who puts the morality into these systems?

FRANK:

Yeah, to make a decision like that. That is the exact question that Tucker Carlson asked Sam Altman, the CEO of OpenAI in a 2025 interview. He asked who's actually making the decisions behind what is the morality of these systems, Sam Altman says, quote, "We consulted, like, hundreds of moral philosophers, people who thought about the ethics of systems." But what does it actually mean to be a moral philosopher in this case?

Well, then Sam Altman is asked, "Who are these people?" And he responds, saying, "Out of courtesy, I don't want to dox my employees." So then, Sam Altman is finally asked if ChatGPT makes a moral assertion, then who's to blame for it? And Sam Altman says, "At the end of the day, I think the person who should be held accountable for those calls is me." He later goes on to say that it's his family, community, school, and religion.

Whatever that means, if you ask his family, community, school, and religion, what's your moral background on life, what, what, how do you treat moral decisions, I'm sure they would disagree. People disagree all the time on this type of thing, and it turns out that many of our top secular AI companies in America don't have a very clear background for how they're actually treating the morals.

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I mean, we would know as Christians that there's only one objective moral reality. We live in a world with objective moral truth. And if you don't have any objective moral truth, which is how secular society operates, you'll end up with a bunch of vague morals, which is exactly what we have with these AI companies. The type of morals you'll often see in secular culture, like consent is the highest good, or don't do that.

I mean, you're allowed to do anything you want as long as it doesn't affect me, and then it's morally okay. So, there are some specific things, some specific, just pillars that these companies have put forth. In fact, Anthropic, the creators of Claude, actually have their own constitution that they've written about how Claude is supposed to operate, and they use some specific language for this. They say that it needs to be broadly, broadly ethical. Only broadly. They only say broadly.

FRANK:

How do they define ethical? Where does that come from? What does that mean?

NATHAN:

Well, again, it's just rooted in secular ethics. I don't know the entirety of the Claude Constitution, but the point is, it's not rooted in objective morality. It's not rooted in Christian—

FRANK:

Let me ask you, are any of you familiar with Robbie Starbuck? You know Robbie Starbuck is?

NATASHA:

On X.

FRANK:

Robbie, yeah, Robbie Starbuck for years has been able to go into Fortune 500 companies and get them to dismantle their DEI program. Because they're immoral, and he knows how to point out to them that if they don't, he's going to reveal this to the world. And once the world sees it, most people are going to go, "Yeah, that's just not right to discriminate against people because of their race or because of their sex or their religion or any of these things." And that's what DEI was doing. Anyway, Gemini, which I believe is owned by Google, and their tagline is "Don't do evil," right.

NATHAN:

It was.

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FRANK:

It was.

NATHAN:

Before they became evil.

FRANK:

Before—

NATHAN:

They don't have that tagline anymore. That's long gone.

FRANK:

They create Gemini, somehow created an entire indictment of this guy Robbie Starbuck, where they invented actually charges against him and articles that said he was guilty of all of these offenses. When the whole thing was a complete sham, he never did any of these things.

And right now, Robbie Starbuck is suing Google for this, and he just won at a certain level where they wanted to throw the case out. And I just texted him the other day, and I, cause I saw him tweet about it, that the judge said, "No, this lawsuit's going forward." Why would an AI system somehow generate false stories about a guy to try and discredit him.

Who's doing this? I mean, how does this happen? Do you have any idea how this could happen?

NATHAN:

How does it happen that AI says something false?

[FRANK]:

Yes.

NATHAN:

Well, the way AI works in the first place is that it's basically just repeatedly over and over taking the entire sentence it's been generating, looking at the whole thing and saying, "What's the next word likely to be?" It's saying, "what's statistically likely to be the next word" based on all of its understanding of human text.

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So, that has some consequences to it. It's the best way we have, we know of right now to be able to create original text based on prompts. But at the same time, there's some interesting considerations, namely hallucinations. So, an AI hallucination is when an AI model like ChatGPT or Gemini, in this case is able to say something that is just not true.

This can happen for a bunch of different reasons. One really interesting reason for this that you might not even think of is that it has a bunch of knowledge. It just does. It knows, so to speak, a bunch of truths. Yet just by the mechanism of what's statistically likely to be next in the sentence, if that's how it's generating text, it's able to combine two truths into a false one, or it's able to just generate an entirely false fact because it considers it to be statistically likely to be true based on human text.

There's a lot more to say about hallucinations here, but AI is totally able to come up with false truths accidentally or intentionally. I don't know exactly the context behind that story. That could totally be the user asking it to do, to make up those false claims, which is definitely a malicious and unethical usage of AI.

But that's just something, another thing that we have to look at with discernment when we look into adopting this technology. It's able to say something false, and the question is, how do we actually use it, and what do we verify about its output? There's a lot of—

FRANK:

Yeah, we're going to get into those questions as the podcast unfolds. But one thing that happened to me is AI can be helpful for say you got a big podcast and you go, I don't have time to watch a two-hour podcast, but I'd love AI to summarize it for me and give the main points.

So I actually had one of my own videos, and I said, you know, I kind of forgot what I said in that video. Can you summarize it for me? It was about the Exodus, and so and so it literally said, "Here are the points that were made. Frank thinks that evidence for the Exodus is found in chariot wheels found in the bottom of the Red Sea." And I never said that, ever.

I don't believe that's true. And so when I looked at it, I said, "I know I didn't say that." And so I typed it back in, and I said, "I never, I'm Frank Turk. I never said that."

NATHAN:

I'm Frank Turk himself!

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FRANK:

And it said, "Oh, we're sorry. We'll correct it in the future." How does this happen? That's just, I mean, why, why would it say that? Because I've never said that in my entire life, and yet it says in this video, that's what I said.

NATHAN:

It's the same concept, hallucinations, and honestly—

[**FRANK**]: Hallucinate, really?

NATHAN:

And honestly too, probably just faulty engineering. If you're looking at a company like Google, which is trying to save costs to run YouTube and stuff like that, then it's probably not going to be running an AI system that's going to listen to the entire video, get the transcription, send it off to an AI.

It's probably going to have some cuts there in the quality and optimization to try to get that. In fact, so many AI systems are designed to just please the user immediately with just instant answers, instant text, even if that can be wrong, a hallucination, or just morally not good and not true.

FRANK:

We're going to give an example of that after the break. But Natasha, this is your 17-year-old son.

How does he know all this stuff? How has he gotten to the point that he being a digital native is one thing? But I mean, did you encourage this? How did he get to this point?

NATASHA:

No, he's completely self-taught. I mean, completely self-taught. I think one of the most valuable things that someone said to me, someone who followed me on Facebook actually, kind of changed our lives because I had posted a question at some point saying, you know, how do you manage screen time?

You know, this is always a concern of parents. How do you not get your kids to be in front of screens so much? And Nathan was frankly in front of screens all the time, but not because he was doing the same kinds of things as most other kids were doing. He was actually creating things and he was teaching himself how to do things. And this woman commented, and she

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said, "You know, I would really let up on the idea that you have to reel back that much on screen time because I'm really glad that my parents realized how valuable it could be for me to spend the time that I did in front of a computer because now I work in the field of technology and I'm using technology for, you know, for the glory of God." And she was like, "And I'm so glad that my parents realized that there was a big difference in how kids can use technology." And that was a turning point for me because then I realized like Nathan's really gifted in this area, and he loves it, and so we gave him more flexibility on that.

FRANK:

We're talking to 17-year-old child prodigy, AI prodigy, Nathan Crain. Here he is, ladies and gentlemen, Natasha Crain's son. We're at the Cross Examined Instructor Academy. We're also talking to the co-author of *The War on Reality*, Phoenix Hayes. Don't go anywhere. We're back right after the break.

AD:

FRANK:

Welcome back to I Don't Have Enough Faith to Be an Atheist. We're talking about AI today. Whether or not you use it, you need to know about this because it's everywhere now. And how should Christians use it properly? What do we have to be aware of? And maybe we can even talk about what different platforms are out there. So if you are going to use it, you can be aware of how they're set up, if at all.

But I want to go to Phoenix Hayes. Phoenix and I co-wrote this book, *The War on Reality*, comes out September 8th. Please pre-order it. It'll help more people to see it if you pre-order it. But we have a whole chapter on this.

PHOENIX:

We do.

[FRANK]: On information—

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PHOENIX:

AI and misinformation.

FRANK:

Talk about an example or two of how AI can mislead you. We've talked about some of it in the previous session, but there's a kind of a famous example we put in the book.

PHOENIX:

So the biggest concern for many regarding AI is that it's a consumer product. It's not an information product. So before, we all relied on Google searches, and then we were given a selection of options. We still had to click on and investigate, right? AI is not concerned about that. It's about convenience and pleasing its user. So once it's learned as much as it can about its user, it's going to filter its answer back to you so that you like it, so that you come back happy customers keep using the product.

Well, an interesting example of this is a video in which a famous Muslim YouTuber, Lily Jay, she's based in Australia, decided she thought that the perfect way to just crash Christianity's 2,000 years of history and evidence was to ask AI, I think it was ChatGPT, "Hey, chat, does Jesus ever claim to be God?" "No, Lily Jay, he doesn't." And she goes through a short list of questions, and she, of course, gets every question that a Muslim would want to hear.

Well, Tim Barnett from Stand to Reason and Red Pen Logic, he's our friend. You guys know him. He put AI to the same test. Of course, it had been studying him and his prompts and his questions for however long. So he asked Chat the exact same question and received the opposite answer. Chat affirmed Jesus's deity.

Chat affirmed the reliability of the Bible. It affirmed whatever it assumed he would want to hear. And it was just, it was a fascinating insight into unless you preemptively train your AI, I think you've done this, to speak to me as objectively, clearly as possible, remove all the fluffy language.

Don't speak to me like I'm your best friend. Just give me objective, fact-based answers. You need to literally tell it to do that, or it will just give you whatever you want.

FRANK:

Is that something that you've noticed in different AI platforms, Nathan? I mean, the ones that you've worked with, have you noticed that some of them are trying to please you all the time?

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NATHAN:

Yes.

FRANK:

All of them or...?

NATHAN:

Well. Yeah, I've used a ton of different AI platforms, even different models, even some of the like models coming from China that are designed to save on money and stuff. I've used basically everything that you could think of when it comes to AI. I found that the ones that are the most consumer product focused, like Phoenix was saying over here, are designed to just always say you're absolutely right on everything, and they'll affirm you.

Like you can literally get a mug that has the Claude logo and then it says you're absolutely right. Like, people are like making money on this. It's relatable merch for people. So it's designed to please you. I think that's a really, a really dangerous phenomenon in AI because people can slowly start to lose touch with reality.

This has happened in many different tragic cases in the past. In fact, a while ago, ChatGPT came out with a specific version of their model called GPT-4-0, and this specific version was known so much for glazing its users, for always telling them that they're right, that it was pretty much really well known, and it was actually eventually shut down.

We still have actually a vocal minority online that's like hashtag keep 4-0 or bring it back because people are really into this. But I found out that you can still talk to this, this AI through their API. It doesn't matter what that means for the purposes of the podcast. But I went on to it and I asked, I pitched it my business idea that was really, really good. I'm going to sell soggy cereal, and it's like, "wow, that's an awesome business idea." And then I'm like, "okay, aren't I just the smartest person ever, GPT-4-0?"

And they're like, "You're amazing. People like you have a certain visionary mindset, and it seems like you're on the path to challenging traditional perceptions of food in media and culture in general. And wow, you're so amazing!" Like, what? It's literally soggy cereal, but it's designed as a consumer product to please the user, and that's what it's going to do.

So then naturally, I mean, as much as I dislike image generation for various reasons as a creative, artistic guy, I told it to generate an image of a brand kit for the company and it made the whole thing. It made Soggsy cereal it was called. It made the boxes. It made my favorite part about

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this, it got so excited, it made the merch too. So you could see in the brand kit, you could get like a Soggsy tote bag.

You could get Soggsy stickers that say the crunch is overrated and like stuff like that. Like it made the merch already. It's designed to please the user. That's a crazy example. That's just dumb. But at the same time, when it's designed to please you, people can get totally out of touch with reality. If it's willing to tell you that Soggsy is a good idea, like just imagine what it's able to tell you.

FRANK:

These are the anti-grape nuts people, right? The people that have broken their teeth on grape nuts are going, "Give me the Soggy cereal. I love that." So it's just, it's just flattering you —

NATHAN:

Maybe there's a market.

FRANK:

But yeah. It's great.

NATHAN:

Maybe GPT-4-0 was secretly objective all along.

FRANK:

It's just flattering you the whole way.

NATHAN:

Yeah, yeah. That's what it's doing. That's what it's doing, yeah.

FRANK:

Now, have you, as you've gone through these different, what do you call, you call them chatbots? What do you call an AI platform? What's the proper way of referring to it?

NATHAN:

So there's two types of AI, broadly speaking, when it comes to text generation. The first, like you said, is a chatbot. You take, you ask it a question, and then you get something right back to you. The other is, it's called an AI agent.

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It's the type of AI that's able to do work. So you can give it a task, and then it's able to, depending on what you've given it access to, like you could give it access to your email or Google Docs or something. You're like, "Write a document on this." It's able to go in, write the document, and then that here's the interesting part: it's able to check if what it did was actually correct or not, and then it's able to keep running a loop of checking if it finished the work correctly, and then it gives it to you.

FRANK:

So that's more about like a process AI like Claude?

NATHAN:

Yeah, but yeah, you can do that with ChatGPT too.

FRANK:

So, have you found, I know people are wondering, okay, I like the convenience of it. You know, if I type into Perplexity, give me all the Bible verses to talk about, you know, Son of Man or something, it's really convenient. It'll do that, but that's probably not one that's going to be tilted by some sort of moral question. Have you found one that you think it maybe is more morally proper or right than others? Or ones that are going to give you more accurate answers on these moral questions?

NATHAN:

Not necessarily. It really depends on what the model has been tuned to do. Most models, most AI models, they're more focused from a development perspective for the companies on doing tasks right now than the moral questions to some degrees.

Like, this has, it seems to me like this has stopped being as big of a question as it needs to be: what is the moral direction of AI? But the truthful answer is that really not many secular AI companies are actually considering this as much anymore or considering safety. There's a lot of focus on progress in terms of the actual technology and being able to do tasks.

FRANK:

Because technology by itself is amoral. It's the people that put moral parameters in it that make the outcome either moral or immoral. But what does this do, Natasha, what is what has been going on amongst our young people and even our old people with regard to education? What has AI done to them or for them, or what are they using it for, and why is that a good or a bad thing?

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NATASHA:

Well, Nathan can actually probably speak more about his peers and how they're using it. But from a parent's perspective, I think it's really interesting to see how quickly. just regular search like using a search engine like Google has been replaced with ChatGPT. You know, I can see that kids are not just going in and like Phoenix was saying, you know, asking a question and then having to sort through all of those millions of responses. Not that we all went through millions, but you would go through at least the first page of search results, right?

And you kind of, in fact, in some of my talks, I used to talk to parents about, you know, helping your kids really think through, like, what's the source here. And you know, should I go to this page or should I go to that page and asking good questions about all those Google results? That's almost cute and antiquated at this point because kids are going straight into ChatGPT a lot of times or whatever you know chatbot that they're using, and they're just relying on whatever summary that has produced.

They're just using that to say, okay, well, that's, you know the collective information from the internet that we're basically getting to. So it takes away a lot of and just in terms of, you know how you're searching the internet, it takes away a lot of that agency and a sense of having to think through all of the questions behind it. Not to mention all the issues that I think that I hear about going on at schools in terms of cheating and things like that. And you can probably speak to how you've seen that happen with your peers, but students are relying on it really heavily.

And I love the Christian school that our kids go to because they're trying to be ahead of these things and they do a lot in terms of talking with the kids about AI. But it seems like it doesn't necessarily take hold with everyone. I don't know. I'd love to hear what you have to think about that in terms of how your peers are using AI.

NATHAN:

I mean, yeah, most people I know at my school use AI to some degree a lot of times to cheat on their assignments because they view all these things as intermediate tasks now.

When we think of tasks that you probably have to do in work a lot, then that's probably writing a document or writing an email, and a lot of kids just go straight to an AI chatbot and they say, "Write this for me." But I think it's so important, more so now, to be able to do that in the first place, even if people are using this in the name of efficiency in life.

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You're just a better person, so to speak, if you can do those things without relying on a machine. I've seen, and it's gotten so crazy, especially with cheating in school and stuff like that. I know multiple people who they write the essay, but they specifically in the prompt, they're like, "Write the essay and include one or two spelling or grammatical mistakes to make it sound human." Like stuff like that.

It's crazy. So people are completely, literally losing their minds to this. They're losing the ability to think just cognitively and also creatively when they're trying to do interesting creative things and rely on image generation to just give them the final result rather than giving them that creative drive of, like working to make the image interesting from a human perspective, and it's like developing all those skills, and a lot of that is being lost in my generation. To a shocking and pretty sad degree.

NATASHA:

Something that's really interesting that I've seen. We've been working a lot on college application stuff and colleges are realizing that everyone's just AIing their essays now and so they're completely relying on a lot of the other parts of the application that they didn't used to as much.

FRANK:

And there's a shocking story we'll tell you about regarding that right after the break. You're listening to I Don't Have Enough Faith to Be an Atheist. Don't go anywhere. We'll be back in a second.

Welcome back to I Don't Have Enough Faith to Be an Atheist. We're talking about AI today. I don't know if you heard this story, it was recently in the news. There was a professor that gave a essay assignment to his students, and he wrote it out. He emailed it to them, and he figured out that I think I want to say 33 of the 35 students all just plugged the instructions into AI and popped out the essay.

What they didn't know was in the instructions he had whited this out, but it said "somewhere in the essay put the word Madagascar in there and make it completely just unintelligible" like the word is used in an unintelligible way. Thirty-three of the 35 students did that. They didn't even read the essay.

They just handed it in, and this word Madagascar appeared in all these essays. This professor failed 33 out of 35 students, because students are getting lazy. In fact, Phoenix, Phoenix Hayes,

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co-author of *The War on Reality*. What does this do to our ability to think if we are going to be that lazy when we're given an assignment?

PHOENIX:

This is what, in many ways, I'm most concerned about, because this is going to affect real-life interaction when we're trying to get to the truth and get to reasonable conclusions about really, really important issues.

This is already a problem where kids and my generation weren't taught logical critical thinking. Now that's going to be exponentially worse because these young kids who are plugging in an information request and AI regurgitates the entire answer, even if they sat down and read it, memorized it, they haven't gone through the process of structuring that perspective.

They've just absorbed a perspective. They have information, but they don't have knowledge or wisdom. So, if you were really to challenge them on a point of view that maybe they agree with, maybe they've memorized every line of ChatGPT's answer, they didn't go through that process of here's my outline, here's the data that I believe, after looking at multiple pieces, that I believe is the strongest.

Here's how I'm going to structure my point and argument so it logically follows when I make my conclusion. They've skipped an essential part of human thinking. One of the few things that separates us beasts from man is that ability to be human and use our critical thinking, reason, logic, and it's going. It's going.

FRANK:

Natasha, what does that do for us as disciples? Because even Nathan was talking about this in the previous segment that it doesn't make us a better person to just go to a chatbot and have it do all the work for us. How do we become better disciples if that's all we're going to do?

NATASHA:

Yeah, it's a really good question because I think that if we start, if we start thinking that AI is basically another kind of human being rather than realizing what it actually is, like Nathan was saying that it's a mathematical model that's producing this language based on what's the most likely thing to, you know, come next, then we're going to give it more weight than it should ever have in terms of the things that we think and the things that we do.

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And I already, you know, I already see this a lot when I talk to people about AI online and we have these conversations. It seems like a lot of people who want to go straight to it, they'll either say they want to go straight to it and they're doing a lot of things there, and it's doing a lot for them that maybe they shouldn't be doing, or they'll say, "I'm never using it for anything at all," you know, and then there's this real fear that comes along with AI. And so there's there's a really broad spectrum there of usage.

But I think that at the end of the day, as Christians, we have to get to a point where we think about how do we actually use this in a way that is that is not harmful, obviously to our spiritual life, but that also glorifies God. But we have to ask the questions. A lot of people aren't asking enough questions, or they don't even want to ask the questions in the first place because they think that this is just inherently this bad thing that we cannot possibly use.

FRANK:

Now, Nathan, I've heard of a AI chatbot called Dominion. I don't know anything about it, but I've heard about it. It, is it put together by Christians? Is it supposed to have a Christian worldview? What do you know about it?

NATHAN:

Okay, so Dominion is basically a small company. They're trying to make Christian AI systems basically. What does it mean for an AI system to be Christian? Well, there's a bunch of different considerations to this. I have some thoughts on this. The first is that it needs to not place the user at the center of their own world because the user isn't God.

FRANK:

That's it. I'm out. I want it to tell me how right I am all the time. Okay, who's gonna use this thing?

NATASHA:

You should use the chat 4-0 thing that he was talking about.

FRANK:

That's right, yeah. Okay, so it's the anti-chat 4-0 thing.

NATHAN:

So, I mean, in another sense, like, I think a Christian AI should tell you that soggy cereal is a horrible business idea. Like, tell you that it, like, it sucks. Like, don't do that because it's trying to

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be objective. It's trying to be rooted in truth. Like, above all, if we believe Christianity to be true, which we do, then we need to root these systems in truth, and objective morals. So, it needs to not place the user at the center of their own universe. The second point is that it needs to understand what it is, in reference to humanity.

It's ultimately just a bunch of numerical calculations. It's not human. So you've probably used ChatGPT before, probably, and it was like, "I recommend this", or "my recommendation is that." It's not a human. It's just performing calculations.

FRANK:

It's aggregating a whole bunch of data and spitting it out to you in what appears to be a personalized form.

NATHAN:

Yeah, it's designed to please you. And then this is another, the last part from the defensive perspective for how Christian AI should operate. And this is what Dominion operates by is that it should not enable role play. And when I mean that, I I'm referring to actually a shocking amount, according to the Telegraph, a UK publication, one in five UK teenage boys are in a relationship or know a peer who considers themselves in a romantic relationship with an AI. It's just mathematically telling you that it loves you. It's, but it's designed to look convincing. It's designed to please the user. One in three people, kids, according to Common Sense Media, consider talking to an AI companion or a AI fake romantic partner to be as satisfying or more satisfying than talking with real-life friends.

FRANK:

Well, cause AI never disagrees with you.

NATHAN:

It never does. It's designed to sound like exactly what you want it to hear, so that's the defensive stuff. Dominion fights against that. If you ask it to be your friend, it won't. It will tell you that it's an AI.

FRANK:

No.

NATHAN:

It's like, "no, I can't be your friend."

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FRANK:

No, I don't like you.

NATHAN:

But that's, yeah, it's not even really a harsh reality. That's just what it is. It's just AI. And it's trying to be objective. So that's the defensive stuff. What are we fighting against? But here's the offensive stuff that-

FRANK:

Offensive meaning good like—

NATHAN:

Yes—

FRANK:

You could use it for this.

NATHAN:

That's the word I like to use.

FRANK:

All right, go ahead.

NATHAN:

When I say defend, I mean it's defending against all these secular tendencies but I'm an optimist when it comes to technology.

I get so excited when you can use technology to create something that's actually beneficial for people, and in the case of, in the case of AI, you can turn AI into something that's legitimately useful and amazing for Christians. What if you move past just all the negatives that are associated with it, able to tune that out of a model and make it something that's able to always find you relevant Bible verses for a specific theme, or it's able to be a tool for pastors of help me research this specific theological issue.

How can I, how can this help my congregation? It's tasks like that which I get so excited about because we often get caught up in a lot of negative stories surrounding AI. But what if we can make it just so much better and exciting? And that's what Dominion is doing.

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FRANK:

Have you seen, can you give us an example of what that would be? Have you seen it work? Has it helped say a pastor figure out what a passage means, or is it mining good commentaries, or what are you thinking? What are some of the tasks it could do you think that would be positive?

NATHAN:

Yeah, so it can do anything. It's designed to preserve just general functionality of AI, as in being able to do work, but still being designed under truth and the lordship of Christ.

So it can do all the standard tasks that a secular AI would do. But if we just think about what's something that you could do with this, I love to think about different use cases for AI because I often feel like it's just what can I think of doing; that's the hard part because there's so many tasks that you can take away, so many interesting ways that you can just make your life more efficient.

So what's something that someone could use: a Christian LLM, a Christian AI system to do? They could ask it to help them think about a specific book of the Bible in relationship to their life at the moment, and it's going to be able to do that. And like I said, does this take the place of human interaction? It shouldn't.

A lot of times, specific Christian tasks are reserved for pastoral counseling or just talking to someone in real life. So, ideally, it should, Christian AI systems should not take that away. In fact, they should probably suggest that you should actually talk to someone in real life about about a specific task. So, there's a lot of interesting considerations there.

If you want a really concrete example, I'll just give you this. Like, what if you're trying to find every instance of let's say, Paul talking about salvation. Like every instance of a passage like that. AI is really good at searching for things, and then suddenly it's a great tool. You don't have to look around anymore.

And suddenly you're able to bring up all those relevant passages. It is; that's exciting to me. That's what I'm optimistic about when I say I'm optimistic about technology.

FRANK:

We have to be balanced about this because too often Christians are the nanny knows, when in reality, this kind of technology can be used for great good, but we have to be aware, and that's what we've done on this podcast.

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So if people want to learn more about what you're doing, then go to natashacrain.com. But tell us about the game again. Like, what is it called?

NATHAN:

Oh yeah, it's capitalism. It's called Nitro Turtles. You can search Nitro Turtles on Steam. Or you could go to nitroturtles.com. That's just a fun game I made. That's not like a Christian thing. It's just fast turtles.

FRANK:

Thank you, Nathan, the child prodigy of the great Natasha Crain. Phoenix, *The War on Reality* has a chapter on this. What do people get if they pre-order *The War on Reality*?

PHOENIX:
